a word from Pastor Bill Davis

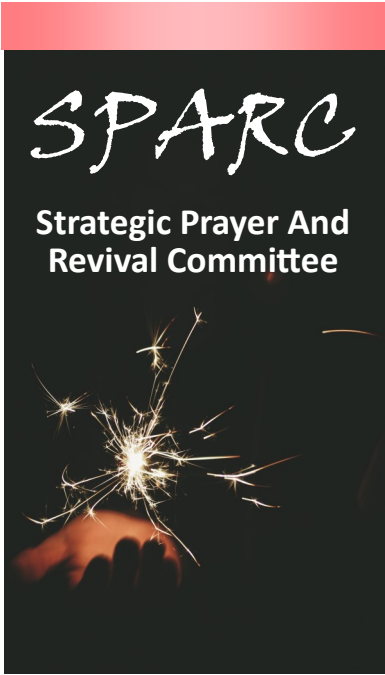
*In you, Lord, I have taken refuge; let me never be put to shame.
In your righteousness, rescue me and deliver me; turn your ear to me and save me.
Be my rock of refuge, to which I can always go;
give the command to save me, for you are my rock and my fortress.
Deliver me, my God, from the hand of the wicked,
from the grasp of those who are evil and cruel.
For you have been my hope, Sovereign Lord, my confidence since my youth.
From birth I have relied on you; you brought me forth from my mother's womb.
I will ever praise you.
~ Psalm 71:1-6*

Many of your friends and family are afraid that the end of life as we know it is imminent. Don't believe me? Consider this ABC News headline from January 28: "2025 'Doomsday Clock': This is how close we are to self-annihilation, scientists say". For the first time in three years, the Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists moved the metaphorical doomsday clock forward; we are now 89 seconds 'til midnight, catastrophe on a world-wide scale. Daniel Holz, chair of the Science and Security board, said: "In setting the clock closer to midnight, we send a stark signal. Because the world is already perilously close to the precipice, any move towards midnight should be taken as an indication of extreme danger and an unmistakable warning. Every second of delay in reversing course increases the probability of global disaster."

There is no shortage of fearful circumstances in this world: the threat of nuclear war or even of one rogue nation employing a nuclear device, predictions of natural disasters, insurmountable debt and collapsing economies, increasingly frequent acts of random cruelty and violence, asteroids, famines, disease . . . the list goes on. We are under continuous bombardment of bad news from the 24-hour news cycle. It is easy to become discouraged, hopeless, despondent.

The passage above (our lectionary Psalm from February 2) provides a counterbalance to the news of the world, a message of bright hope in glorious defiance of the endless stream of gloom and doom. It is in God that we take refuge, not earthly institutions. The always holy, never changing ruler of the universe is the source of our hope, not the continuously corrupt, ever fickle rulers of the world. God is the one to whom we can always go, the one who is always there, the one who never shames us. This is why we as believers may live confidently and sing sincerely. "I will ever praise you," the psalmist exalts—in times of joy or in times of sadness.

Psalm 71--like many passages throughout Scripture--reminds us that our citizenship is not of this world. We are temporary workers here, not permanent residents. Is it possible to be completely unaffected or uninvolved in the troubles of this world? Of course not. And the Bible does not call us to be. The Bible calls us to be ever aware that while we are *in* the world, we are not *of* it. We are not to be obsessed with its problems or impressed with its powers. Nearing the end of his earthly life, Jesus bluntly acknowledged the hardships and tribulations that are part of our earthly existence, and he concluded: "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world" (John 6:33). On the first Sunday of February, we will recite--as we always do on Communion Sunday--the mystery of faith: "Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again." Remember this, too: Christ is with us today. Do not be afraid.



BE A FRUIT BEARER

... the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law. Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. Galatians 5:22-24

For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light (for the fruit of the light consists in all goodness, righteousness and truth) and find out what pleases the Lord. Have nothing to do with the fruitless deeds of darkness, but rather expose them. Ephesians 5:8-11

God of Light, thank You for lighting our path. When we walk in Your light there is no darkness. We don't have to be gardeners to know that plants grow toward the light. Likewise we flourish when we are in the Light – which is the Holy Spirit of Christ. To be in step with the Spirit is to live in such a way as to reflect the fruit of the Spirit which are the characteristics of Jesus. Every time we face darkness it draws us to Your light. As --- continues to walk in Your Light may she overflow with the fruit of Your Spirit sharing generously, as You are generous, with others.

Live as children of the Light.

Let your words be the genuine picture of your heart.

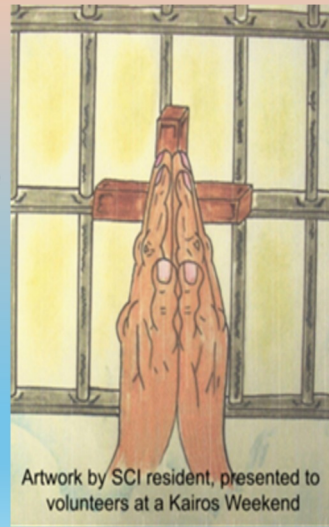

CONLEY'S PEOPLE OF INTEREST – Sandie Wysocki

I was saddened to learn late last year that Sandie Wysocki is leaving Conley's church in a few months this Spring to move back to Malvern, Pennsylvania to live with her daughter Janeen and be closer to her family that includes 3 children, 9 grandchildren, and 4 great grandchildren. She will be greatly missed!

I recently sat down with Sandie to capture some of her thoughts before she leaves to share with you.



How long have you been coming to Conley's? What first led you to Conley's? "I started coming to Conley's church in 2002 when Pastor Randy was pastor. Barbara Moxey and Marge Logan, neighbors of mine and members of Conley's at the time, invited me to come with them to a service at Conley's chapel. I had just moved to Delaware from Pennsylvania and felt comfortable with Conley's from the start. Conley's people and adherence to the Bible were what I was most looking for and appealed to me."

What has been your vision for Conley's? "My vision has always been to get the gospel out and bring people to Christ. This includes getting young people to come to Conley's to hear the gospel in its true form."

What are some things that people may not know about you?

- "I was a hairdresser starting at age 18 for 23 years. I was also a limo driver for 10 years, when I drove around Bea Arthur, Kristi Yamaguchi and the Boys to Men! I also used to paint and sell sweatshirts and made men's silk neck ties. I also had a British tea business when I went to people's homes and made and served the entire tea party including scones, jam, and cream. I went to Key West to visit my son from January-April for four years and at the time worked at a Tiki bar. Most recently I have been making costume jewelry and love to give it away for free to strangers to make people smile."
- "I served as officiant for both of my granddaughters as well as my sister for their weddings."
- "I have a scripture verse on every single door of my home, on my sink and outside my front so when people visit they have no choice but to stop and notice. For example, this is on my bathroom door: **"Your hands made me and formed me; give me understanding to learn your commands. May those who fear you rejoice when they see me, for I have put my hope in your word."** (Psalm 119:73-74). This verse is on my side door: **"I can do all this through him who gives me strength."** (Philippians 4:13)." Continued on next page>

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- “When I first became a Christian I attended Philadelphia Bible College for a semester.”
- “I revived the prayer shawl ministry at Conley’s but I have also been President of UMW, worked at the Conley’s Soup kitchen, did girls night out, helped out with funeral dinners, taught Bible class in my home for 5 years, and have written two collections of devotions and poetry one based on my Bible study class and one based on my experiences as a Christian. I volunteer at the Conley’s Thrift Store Saturday mornings where my favorite thing to do getting a chance to help and encourage people.”
- “I like to pay for people’s restaurant checks anonymously. I like to make people smile. I give people smiley face pins now because it was my husband’s insignia on everything he wrote.”

What will you miss the most about Conley’s church after you leave? “I will most miss the people, my many friendships and the love that we extend to one another when its needed. I will also miss the Sunday worship service and Pastor Bill’s great sermons.”

I remember you writing in your 2024 Lenten devotional, “Anyone who knows me knows I am always waiting for the opportunity to share the love of Jesus and God’s plan of salvation in the conversation.” So ***how do you want to most be remembered after you move to Pennsylvania?***

“I have a God given ability to be able to walk up to strangers and start a conversation that eventually leads to talking about God and salvation. I want to be remembered that I did all that God asked me to do in the time he gave me to do it in the time I spent at Conley’s and the people I came in contact with. I know that I was not a perfect person but I hope that I always tried to do my best to show God’s love through my life.”

Feeding the Flock

Over the past few weeks, I have read a number of devotionals and heard several sermons calling on the community of believers to care for the poor, the oppressed, the homeless: following the example of Christ. Here at Conley's, we have so many amazing ministries that endeavor to reach out into those groups of people and I am certain that most of us do not think of these efforts as evangelism. In our current Bible studies about becoming "Contagious Christians," selfless serving and relationship/friendship building are two of the ways identified, that we can bring Christ-like love into these communities, Evangelism! I know all of us that serve in these ministries have witnessed changes in some of the people that we have established relationships with. Feeding the Flock has evolved from only providing physical food, to providing spiritual nourishment through the formation of these relationships.

Many people in the low income projects that we serve, have had food stamps reduced significantly and are struggling to get adequate food. We are so blessed to be able to provide many staples.

We appreciate all the donations both financial and all the food and clothing you have provided. During the recent bout of severe weather, this allowed us to provide extra food and warm clothing. Those people who have to rely on Community Resource Center and the Code Purple Shelters are very appreciative.

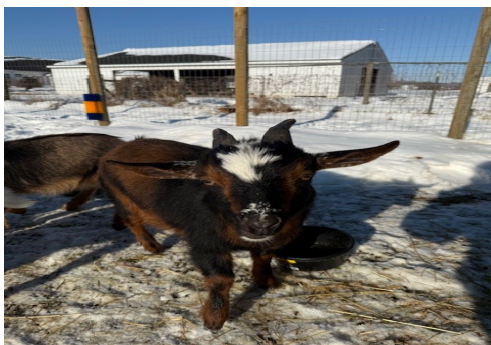


Providing a safe and fun environment where young people can learn about God, build their faith, and form friendships.

Conley's Chapel Cemetery is adding a new Columbarium!

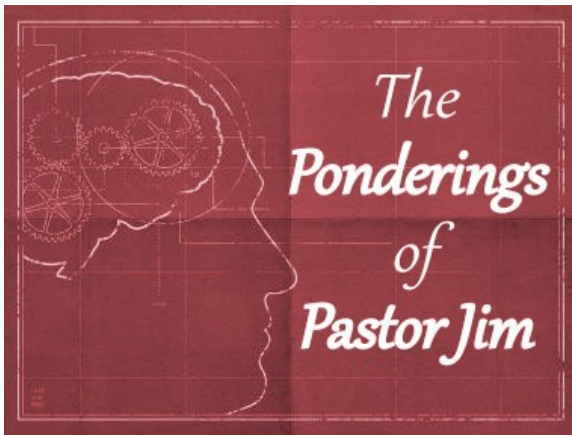
Conley's is adding a Columbarium to the Chapel Cemetery this spring. The plan is to increase our capacity and to better accommodate families choosing cremation. The new Columbarium will contain 48 niches, each of which can hold two urns. The pre-construction sales price of each niche is \$750 and after construction (June 1, 2025) the price will be \$1,000 per niche.

Over time, we have sold almost all the gravesites within the cemetery. Currently, there are less than twenty graves available. In 2020, the Trustees voted to restrict purchase of gravesites to members of Conley's congregation only. Couple this with the fact that since the pandemic, over 60% of families are choosing cremation over a full burial. The cost of a memorial service, cremation and interment of ashes is much more economical today. For all these reasons, the Trustees voted to purchase our first Columbarium last fall.

To prepare our site for the new construction, in December 2024 the small block building behind the Chapel was removed and the ground leveled in preparation for the spring construction. The cleared site has enough space for up to four columbariums in the future and is easily accessible via wheelchair directly from the cemetery service road. We also plan to plant shrubbery in the immediate area to differentiate the columbarium area from the rest of the cemetery.

We went to church in Nashville. In the absence of the preacher, the service was done by children. During the passing of the peace, children walked all around the sanctuary and shook people's hands. The children's message involved fitting marbles and sand in the same jar – with the point being when we think the marbles (the worries of our life) fill the jar, there is always room for Jesus (the sand) who can fit between the marbles, And then there was the prayer. A young girl in a chiffon dress came forward and start-

ed to pray while kneeling at the altar. She thanked God for her kidneys, her heart, her lungs and on and on it went with her listing numerous body parts that she was thankful for. It was a lengthy prayer. She then got up from the altar and started to walk back to her seat but then she turned and went back to the altar. "Oh no," we all thought. What else! She said: "And God bless our preacher who is away. Amen." We all smiled at her thoughtfulness as she quickly regained her seat.

In a red-letter Bible, the first words that Jesus spoke (in red) in the Gospel of John are: "What are you looking for?" And then secondly he offers: "Come and see."

The wise men were looking for the child Jesus. They found him, but no one fully knew him until much later. Until the cross and resurrection. On Friday he was nailed to a cross, but Easter resurrection Sunday was coming. Our life is like that – Satan squeezes us hard on Friday, but Sunday's coming to give us relief. That's the gospel, that's the good news. Let's remind each other of the good news.

It's Friday – but Sunday's coming.



Marie and I were married at Whatcoat United Methodist Church in Camden Delaware on Sunday June 4, 1995. Our plan was to have a worship service, and an hour later, after the church was emptied of worshippers, have our wedding ceremony. It was to be a small gathering; we invited about 75 family members and friends to attend. Then afterwards we would have cake and light refreshments in the fellowship hall. It was a good plan. However, after the church service, most of the congregation stayed. So instead of 75 attending our wedding, it was more like 250! And following the ceremony everyone found their way into the fellowship hall for the reception. There was not going to be enough food. Believe me when I say, I seriously prayed for a Cana-like miracle. (Lord, when the wine ran out in Cana, you made more appear. Can you do the same for our refreshments?) But, alas, we ran out of food.

Yet there was a miracle in our wedding story – nobody cared about the shortage. There were just hugs, congratulations, and excited chatter. Not a soul mentioned the lack of food. And when we talk with old friends about our wedding day, no one remembers the shortage of refreshments. They just recall the happiness and joy of that day.

Leaving the funeral home with my Dad's ashes, a white snowy afternoon, I continued to hum the tune that was playing when I got out of my car after arriving. The mournful song was "Vincent: Starry, Starry, Night" by Don Mclean. A reflective composition about the life of painter Vincent VanGough, I've always been drawn to it. In my head I started to compose a poem, replacing the lyrics with my own. Below is the result. Please listen to the song, let it's heaviness, rest on you.
