a word from Pastor Bill Davis

“The sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light; the stars will fall from the sky, and the heavenly bodies will be shaken.” At that time people will see the Son of Man coming in clouds with great power and glory. And he will send his angels and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of the heavens. Now learn this lesson from the fig tree: As soon as its twigs get tender and its leaves come out, you know that summer is near. Even so, when you see these things happening, you know that it is near, right at the door.

Mark 13:24-29

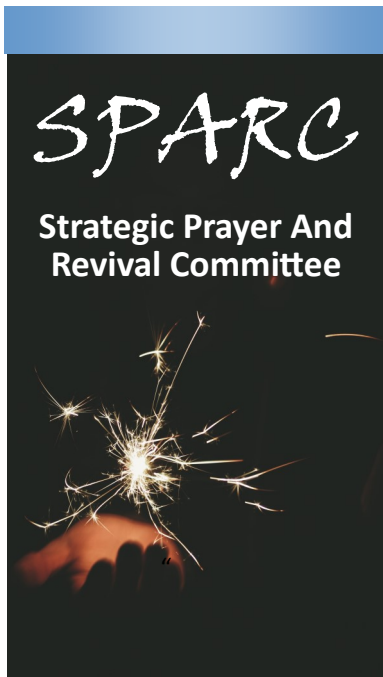
“Don’t spoil the ending!” It is common knowledge that one’s enjoyment of a story is heightened by the tension of not knowing the outcome beforehand. Suspense and gradual discovery are a key part of the reading or viewing pleasure. Or are they? A study conducted at the University of California, San Diego surprisingly revealed that most people actually enjoy their reading/viewing experience more when they know how the story will end (Journal of Psychological Science, Sept. 2011). The study found this to be true even when the story was a mystery or had an unexpected twist ending. Researchers concluded that knowing how a story will resolve enables readers/viewers to better appreciate plot development—they are better able to organize subtexts within the story, notice small but important details, anticipate the implications of events, and understand ambiguities that arise in the narrative.

Personally, I’m not convinced . . . so please don’t spoil anything for me! Regardless of what our opinion may be on the matter, Jesus was not reluctant to “spoil” the end of the story. In the passage above (from our reading for the first Sunday of Advent), Jesus reveals the dramatic culmination of human history. And the church took his words to heart. The season of Advent-- and indeed the entire Christian liturgical year--begins with the end. Not with Mary and Joseph. Not with a manger and swaddling clothes. Not with shepherds and an angel choir. Not with Magi offering gifts. We start the new year not with Christ’s first advent, but with his second.

The second coming of Christ is not a quiet event. The end is not tender and mild. It is earth-shaking. Literally. As terrifying as it is beautiful. The season of Advent is about Christ’s power and glory and makes plain that to follow Jesus means complete surrender to his lordship. By beginning at the end, Advent jolts us out of our quiet, comfortable Christianity and our twinkly, frazzled Christmas preparations. Advent calls us to deep repentance, passionate devotion, and great hope.

Knowing the end of the story enables us to rightly approach the Child in the manger—we know that there, wrapped in humble strips of cloth, is the Savior whose powerful and glorious return will make all things right. And with this knowledge, we are better able to see God at work in our world, to notice small but important blessings, to anticipate all things working together for good, and to faithfully accept ambiguities that arise in our lives. As we progress through the weeks of Advent, let’s take time to prayerfully consider how the promise of Christ’s return in the future can shape our life together here and now.

Here are some initial concepts and thoughts that I found at **"How to Write a Devotional: The Definitive Guide"** (at <https://jerryjenkins.com/how-to-write-a-devotional/>) about devotionals in general (more details to come in January's newsletter):

"What You Should Bring to the Table -

- Writers of devotionals should have a **pure heart** (James 3:8-11). With **humility, graciousness, and spiritual sensitivity**, you can create something that can alter a reader's thinking and behavior.
- **Provide an engaging piece of writing** that offers new insights. Be genuine and honest,
- Good devotional writing says, **Walk with me a few minutes**. Examine something with me.

Meet Readers Where They Are -

- **"People turn to devotionals to meet deep needs.** Some have lost friendships, been divorced, suffered from criticism, betrayal, or the death of a loved one. They need the balm of God's comfort.
- Others seek intimacy with God. Their prayer lives are lax, their testimonies weak, and their church attendance sporadic. They need to find their way back to Jesus.
- Some just want to grow spiritually or to discover a better way to share their faith. **Your devotional may be their only connection to the Bible all day!"**

The 2025 edition of Conley's Lenten devotional might end up mostly as a book of pictures or artwork or a collection of prayers, favorite hymns or personal testimonies. It's up to you. **But during this Christmas season look around you, jot down ideas and journal your thoughts.**

Soup for the Soul

The Wednesday Soup Social continues to be a popular stop for a cup of soup, a sandwich and great fellowship. Dale Kehrer and team members appreciate all those who have contributed to this ministry by bringing soup and desserts. As we head toward the end of the year, some of Dale's teams have experienced losses due to people moving away and some with health issues. If you would like to volunteer, especially for the Week 1 team; contact Dale Kehrer.

Soup and desserts are always needed. Sign up sheets are in the Narthex.

Family Assistance/ Social Concerns

Calls for assistance have been coming in at a steady pace. Our partner, Love, INC of Mid-Delmarva has begun instituting a new policy. Fielding repeated calls for help from the same people has led to these people being assigned to a case manager and transitional ministry programs prior to receiving additional aid in the time frame of one year. This approach encourages "neighbors" to learn to budget, prioritize spending and identify areas where they can save. Sandy continues to see people who need gas cards. People have also begun calling for Mountaire boxes. Thank you to everyone who has contributed coats and clothing to our ministries. We have been able to clothe many people.



Feeding the Flock

Preparing and serving approximately 300 meals per week can seem overwhelming but we have a great team of people. This month we said goodbye to Melissa Juliano who has returned to the workforce. We also had the pleasure of having Ken, a travel nurse at Beebe, join us several times for prep and distribution. He hopes to come back next spring. We have continued taking bag lunches to 4 locations in Millsboro, distributing about 200 lunches there. All of these people look forward to the fresh produce, milk and eggs we bring. We are also able to supplement the bags with sandwiches and pastries from Wawa. On Mondays and Wednesdays, we take lunches to the tent encampment on Route 1. This will end November 30 when the encampment is taken down and the Code Purple shelters and Community Resource Center open. We are planning to help with meals at the CRC throughout the winter. We will also be providing meals to the Women's shelter at LCOS on Thursdays.

We are thankful for the contributions we have been receiving from Oak Orchard Community Church. Each Thursday they have been sharing some of what they receive from Weis and Harris Teeter with us. This includes many desserts and breads.

Our last deliveries from the Lewes Farmers Market will be on December 9 and 10. We are hopeful that we will be included in the grant program for next year.

Conley's Pantry

The Pounding was a success in helping to stock up our pantry. We have been fortunate to receive many staples from the Food Bank of Delaware, but cereal, jelly, Spam, Vienna sausages and canned chili and stew are always in demand and are some of the items we don't receive with regularity

The Walk to Emmaus

*A Transforming Experience
of Christian Community*

The Walk to Emmaus is an experience of Christian spiritual renewal and formation that begins with a three-day short course in Christianity. It is an opportunity to meet Jesus Christ in a new way as God's grace and love is revealed through other believers.

This experience begins with a sponsor's prayerful discernment followed by an invitation and application being offered to the participant. The application is then sent to the leaders of the local Emmaus community. Ours is the Chesapeake Walk to Emmaus. Leadership reviews and prays over the application and extends an invitation to attend the three-day experience.

After the three-day experience, participants meet in small groups to support each other in their ongoing walk with Christ.

The objective of Emmaus is to inspire, challenge and equip the local church members for Christian action in their homes, churches, and places of work. Emmaus lifts up a way for our grace-filled lives to be lived and shared with others.

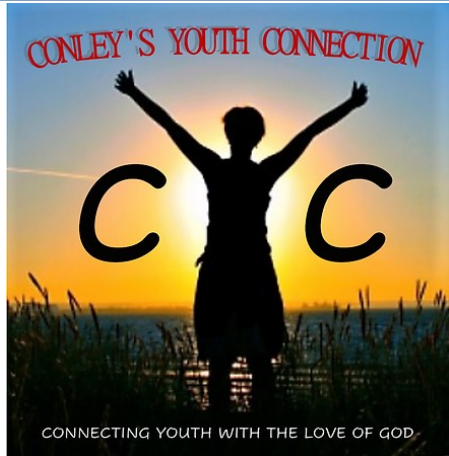

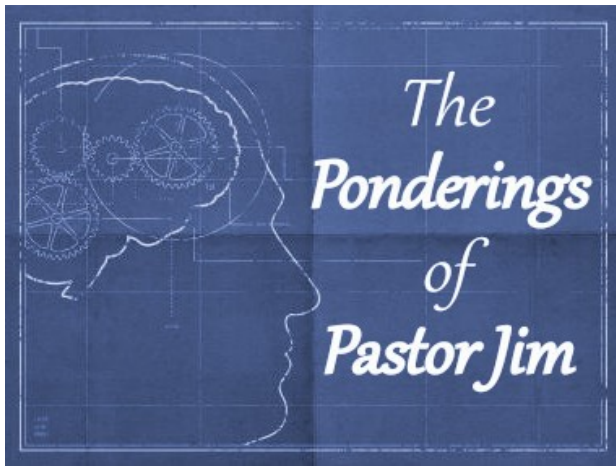

We flew to Albuquerque to visit my son and his wife. Jay and Susan had been bragging about the hot air balloon festival held annually in Albuquerque. We finally were able to schedule a visit to see the balloons. It was everything they said it was. Hundreds and hundreds of colorful hot air balloons were launched into the sky. What a sight it was!

The balloons were launched very early in the morning, so when we got back to Jay's home, we had a full day available to us. Jay and Susan live on the edge of the Sandia Mountains. Jay is a frequent mountaineer. He suggested that I go with him for a modest one-mile hike in the mountains. Albuquerque is 4,000 feet above sea level, and the mountains were even higher than that. We started out, father and son, on a one-mile hike – 2,000 additional feet above sea level. The air was thin, the sun was hot, we carried no water – what could go wrong? I hung in there but at the end of the walk, I told Jay I had to sit down. We sat on a rock along the street. I was feeling poorly, nauseated, and I just had to lie down. So, in the gutter of the street, down I went feeling sick to my stomach. Cars rolled by me. It must have been a sight. Jay called Susan who came to drive us home. It was a humbling experience.

Jesus told this story. In the treasury of the temple, people would put money in the collection boxes. Some people made a show of how much money they contributed. And then a poor humble widow came and quietly – almost secretly - put in two small copper coins. Their combined worth was about a penny. Jesus made the point: a lot of people simply contributed out of their abundance. But out of her poverty, the widow privately gave all that she had, even all that she had to live on.

The widow's sacrificial gift encourages us to share what we have with others. The two coins represent giving everything we are, holding nothing back.

Recently, the mission chair of our church felt a burden for the impoverished people of Appalachia. Through the ministry of the Appalachian Service Project (ASP), she challenged church members to give up a week of their time to go to Appalachia and help rebuild the dilapidated homes of the residents there. She recruited a team of seven adults who went to Man, West Virginia and refurbished a widow's home. They gave a sacrificial offering of themselves and made the world a little bit better.

To graduate seminary, Drew Theological School requires seniors to submit for approval a Theology of Ministry paper. This 20-page thesis takes one's seminary education and explains how it will be used as they serve in a local church. Our thesis class worked all semester on it and submitted it to the professor for approval. They all came back rejected!

The professor explained that the heart of Christian ministry is the cross and the resurrection. Jesus sacrificed his life for us on the cross – he gave everything for us. He rose again to bring new life. So too, our ministry needs to be about our self-sacrifice which brings about new life. We redid our papers accordingly. A lesson learned.

Those two small copper coins represent giving all we have to the ministry of the Lord. I work at our church's thrift shop as a cashier. People will ask – what does your church do with the money you make here? I often quote Scripture - James 1:27 "Religion that God accepts is this: to look after widows and orphans in their distress." Much to our general manager's dismay I say, "we help widows and orphans." But really, we do help people in distress. That is the ministry of the church.

One message of the widow's offering is this: some of the greatest acts of faith occur simply, selflessly, and unobtrusively. You cannot outgive God. And our humble offerings will produce great dividends.
